SESRA players at the World Championships: Gough third, Millman fourth

The World Squash Masters was played August 23-28 in Cologne, Germany. Several SESRA players made the journey and played well:



Playing for the U.S. in the 70s, Michael Gough finished third, defeating Vincent Taylor 10,(8),6,10. Gough lost in the semis to Barry Gardner in five, (6),(5),7,14,4 and had several match points in the fourth game.

Said Gough, "OK here's the scoop. A very disappointing World Champs

but coming to terms with it and 3rd in the World isn't too bad. The over 70's was split into 4 groups and we each played 4 matches in the groups. From there the top 2 finishers went to the last 8 which became knockout. I won all 4 matches in my group 3-0, went on to last 8, won that 3-0, then played top seed in semis. I was 2-0 up, then 2-1, had 4 match balls in 4th, and lost in 5. He went on to lose the final to the guy I beat 3-0 in semis of Brit Open last year. In the 3rd place match, I won 3-1 and so won the bronze medal for the U.S. Still having nightmares about the loss!!"



Playing for England in the 50s, Richard Millman fell to Scotland's Alan Thomson in the semis, 3,5,(11),6 and Sweden's Bjorn Almstrom (8),5,6,8 in the playoff. Pat Millman fought her way to the 9-12 round in the women's 55s before falling to Alison Madden, 8,6,4.

Playing for Ireland in the 45s, Andre Maur won three round before falling to England's Peter John Gunter 6,(8),5,7 just short of the quarterfinals.

Among other U.S. players, Dominic Hughes won three rounds before being stopped by England's Mark Woodliffe, 5,5,8 to reach the quarters

New news:

Expect more doubles action in Charleston as Australian Matt Jenson has taken over the reins in Kiawah and Charleston from Richard and Pat Millman, who will be dividing their time between England and Westchester, NY.



Matt, 31, was most recently the head pro at the Olympic Club in San Francisco. He's currently ranked fifth in the International Squash Doubles Association (ISDA) rankings. From the ISDA

The youngest player ranked in the ISDA top-10 (he turned 30 this past May), Jenson teamed up with Clive Leach last season to reach at least the semifinal round seven times in the nine ranking events that they entered and to attain the final in Boston, where they emerged with a 16-15 fifth-game victory in the semis over Paul Price and Ben Gould before barely falling short in a grueling 3-2 final-round marathon against Viktor Berg and Damien Mudge, one of five five-game matches that went against them during the course of the season. Jenson, whose older brother Dan had been Mudge's chief nemesis in singles during their teenage years and gone on to make the PSA top-five before injuries ended his career, played for several years on the PSA tour himself, then moved on to early-2000's stints at the

Birmingham Athletic Club in Michigan and at Piping Rock in Long Island. Prior to this past season, Jenson had reached the finals of the '08 tour stops in Cleveland with Preston Quick and at Sea Island, where he and Leach in their debut as partners followed a solid semifinal win over Quick and John Russell by going up 2-1, 11-8 against Berg and Mudge before losing that game in a tiebreaker and the fifth 15-8.
